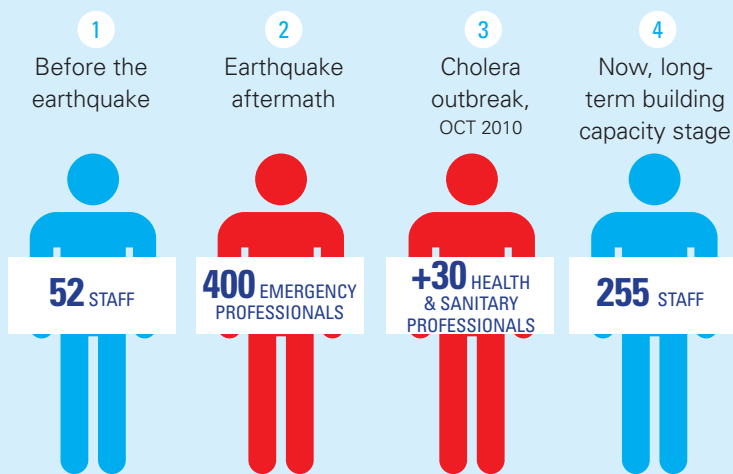

Back to School

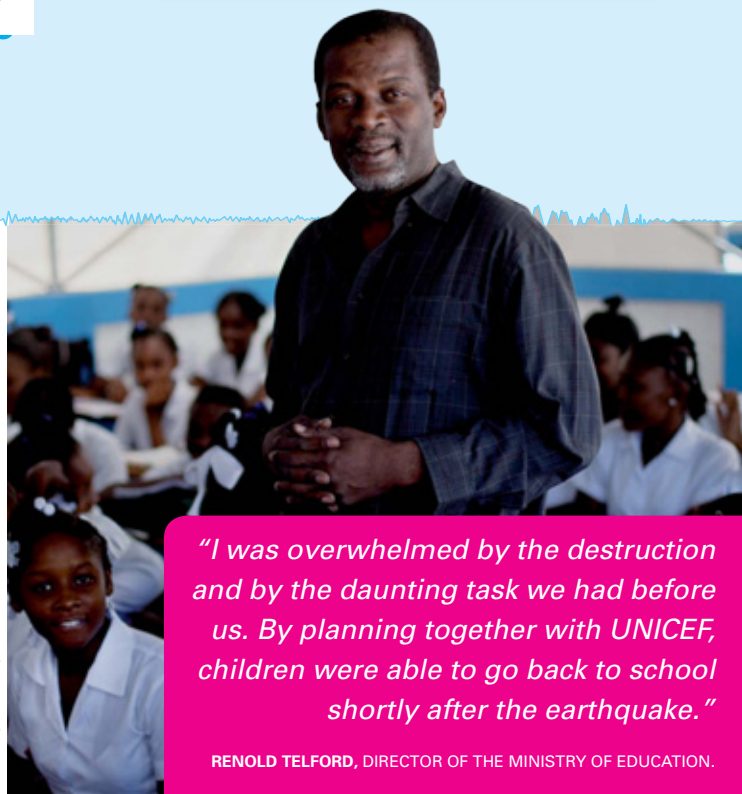


BEFORE:

- Less than half of children went to school.
- 4,000 schools destroyed by the quake.

AFTER:

- 193 safe, earthquake-resistant schools for 80,000 children.
- New learning materials for 750,000 children and 15,000 teachers.

Protecting Children

Remember Sterling? The 5 year old girl lost her family in the quake aftermath. Without you, she could still be alone today. But thanks to your help, we happily reunited Sterling with her dad.

UNICEF reunited another 2,769 children with their families and registered 8,780 separated children so they can be cared for safely.

A major step: the government signed the Hague Convention on Adoption, which protects children's rights by creating standards for adoptions.

Removing Rubble

About half (5 million m³) of the quake rubble has been cleared. Great progress! It is estimated to take 5 years to remove the debris from the Christchurch earthquakes.

What Next?

UNICEF has moved from emergency life-saving mode to building the capacity of local organisations and communities so they can be self-sufficient.

Our priorities for 2012 are to help the 500,000 people still living in displacement camps find safe homes and to ensure all children go to school.
